

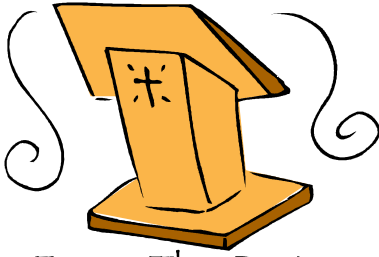

NORMAN HANSON

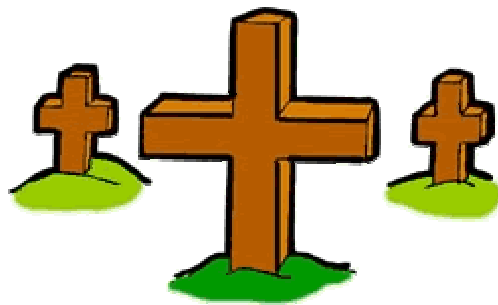


Norman was born on June 11, 1919 to Nels and Laura (Svenkeson) Hanson on a farm in Clay County. He grew up and attended Riverside Country School. He entered the United States Army in 1940. He spent 3 years overseas in 83rd Armored Battalion in the European Theatre during WWII. He was honorably discharged from the army in 1945.

On October 10, 1948 he married Regina Hagene in Concordia Lutheran Church, rural Glyndon, MN, together they had four children. He was baptized, confirmed in his faith and a lifelong member of Concordia Lutheran Church. Norman was a lifelong farmer who enjoyed farming, carpentry, and fishing. He was a member of the Sons

of Norway, American Legion, served on the Country School board and also served as trustee of his church. He helped with repair projects for Morken Township and in his later years he enjoyed going to his Army reunions. But most importantly Norman enjoyed spending time with his family and friends.

He is survived by his wife of 57 years, Regina, Glyndon, MN. Three sons: Keith (Kathy), Glyndon MN; Neil (Polly), Glyndon MN; Les, Janesville WI. One daughter: Cheryl (Richard) Ostlie, Northwood ND. Two brothers: Arthur, Glyndon; Walter, Glyndon. Nine grandchildren: Heidi (Keith) Nelson, Ritchie (Jane) Ostlie, Jenny Ostlie, Holly Hanson, Kelsey Hanson, Erik (fiancé Kristine) Hanson, Jerod Hanson, Laura Hanson, Kristi Hanson.

BITS and PIECES

Adele Swanson reunites with former student

It was 1947 when J. Michael McAdams entered Adele Swanson's first grade class at the old Alderwood Elementary School. Swanson remembered "the little boy in her classroom." And McAdams remembered her. When she retired in 1974, McAdams honored her with a gift - a beautiful framed picture of a bird.

From then until she recently moved into an assisted living facility, that picture hung on her wall.

Once she moved into the assisted living center, she needed to reduce the number of her belongings. Her neighbor, Lorna Turcott, agreed to help track down McAdams so that the picture could be returned to him.

With help from retired Edmonds School District principal Gloria Stebri, the McAdams family was found.

McAdams' mother had been a secretary in the Edmonds School District. When she heard that Swanson was retiring, she told her son. His fond memories of her inspired him to send her

a piece of art he had done for the Edmonds High School yearbook, *The Driftwood*, during his high school years.

McAdams included a thank-you to her for her dedication and the memories she had given him by inscribing the note, "Thank you for being part of me still," on the picture when he originally gave it to her more than 30 years ago.

After graduation from high school, McAdams served in the United States Coast Guard. He then attended the University of Washington where he received a degree in fine arts with a minor in education.

He first taught at the private Little School in Bellevue, where he was when he sent the picture to Swanson.

After that, he taught for 22 years in Monroe, did some graduate work in environmental science and earned a master's degree in educational technology. He now manages a computer lab at Crystal springs Elementary School in the Northshore District.





Finally, in February the two were re-connected. Because of the efforts of Turcott and Stebri, McAdams was able to visit Swanson at the sunrise Senior Living Center in Edmonds where they reminisced and she returned the picture to him.

“You’ve had a great run,” McAdams said. “How many thousands of lives did you touch?”
