- 3 cups diced rhubard
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 ½ tablespoons flour
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice

Beat eggs well. Add sugar, flour and lemon juice. Add rhubard and mix well. Put into an unbaked 9 inch pie crust. Sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Delicious!

So you BECOME 21, TURN 30, PUSH 40, REACH 50, and MAKE it to 60.


You've built up so much speed that you HIT 70! After that its a day-by-day thing, you HIT Wednesday!

I and two of my granddaughters met the first flight in July and we enjoyed all of the people who came to the airport. It was something to see those old Vets – some were in their 90's – come off the plane. Everyone was waving flags, etc. See you at the airport on September 8th!
