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From the Pastor

Summer is often thought of as the time for life and growth, that all too brief season that has followed an unrelenting winter and a tepid spring. While we


all anticipate the warmth, sun and green of summer, sometimes our own personal experience stands at odds with nature's display of life. I think of our shut-ins. Some of them don't even have an opportunity to open a window to experience the fragrances that the outdoors provides to the rest of us. Others may have open windows but may not have a gleam of sunlight on their skin for days. Summer may be a season of false hopes and empty promises for many. I have first hand sympathy for those of you in this position. After nearly a month of spasmodic coughing, light headedness/weakness, I saw a doctor this week, who stated that I was recovering from pneumonia and that while I was no longer contagious, it

could take an extended time to heal. Within the last week both my parents, in separate injuries, have spent a combined 10 days in the hospital and as of June 17 finally are back home, both confined to the main level of their farm house and both dependent on walkers and home services (so far limited to myself for a week and my brother for a week). This has not been a good time for my parents (who are in their mid to upper 80's), but their suffering and my family's participating in it, is certainly building empathy for those who have fared far worse. Suffering can produce empathy, where we can truly experience a measure of the pain others are going through. None of us volunteer for suffering, but sooner or later it will come to us all. The only question is, what will we do with the suffering? Will it make us bitter, cynical and cold? Or will we choose to assimilate it allowing it to make us empathetic, open hearted and caring?

If this summer is less than ideal for you or your loved ones I commend to you the first 8 chapters of the book of Romans. I find chapters 5 and 8 particularly fitting as the Apostle Paul takes on questions of suffering.

In the mean time, I pray that God would bless you when the sun shines on you, when you inhale the smells of life that nature affords us and when the summer breeze wafts gently by you. However, know that God is with us when we do NOT have such an experience of summer and that through his Son Jesus Christ's sufferings can empathize with us better than anyone else.





WHAT IS A CHURCH?



A church is many things.

It is a building with a soul.

It is a building with a heart.

It is a building that breaths and sings and feels and prays. It is a church.

A Church is more than bricks and wood and steel

and concrete, and the pews and drapes and stained glass windows.

A Church is hope and heart and faith and love and kindnessand people.

A Church is more than land and lights and windows and doors.

A Church is warmth in a man's heart, comfort in a woman's soul, faith in a child's eyes.

There are small churches nestled in quiet valleys. There are large churches towering on city boulevards.

There are rich churches- and churches not so rich- but large or small, towering or tiny, all churches have the same quiet dignity, the same warm glow.

There are mighty cathedrals, hamlet chapels, wayside chirches and New England meeting houses. There are churches for a thousand souls, and churches but for a few.

However, large or small, on Sabbath mornings they have a similar spiritual brightness.

It is the purest of buildings, the most serene of structure- it stands night and day as a beacon for the lost. It is a lighthouse for the lonely and troubled.

The Church is a building of truce, standing in the middle of the battlefield of life.

A Church is a building of ethics, a house of worship, a house of prayer, a house of meditation.

It is and echo of a hymn on a summer Sunday morning. It is the music of bells across the snow-flaked prairies. It is the symphony of an organ resounding across the green grass of spring. It is an island of serenity on the Sabbath of a great city.

It is a building with a tower- a center of light. It is built on the foundation of forgiveness. It is a citadel of hope. Its roots are buried in the past. Its tall spires hold out arms of tomorrow. A Church knows laughter. A Church knows tears. A Church knows peace of mind. A Church knows serenity in troubled times.


