

Recipe of the Month Zucchini Beef Hotdish

Serves 6-8

Ingredients

1 lb. hamburger

3 medium zucchini's unpeeled and chopped (or one large one with seeds removed)

I large onion chopped

1 cup shredded carrots

1 can cream of chicken soup

1/2 tsp .salt

1/4 tsp. pepper


1/2 cup sour cream or Cheez Whiz

6 oz. box chicken flavor Stovetop stuffing

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- Brown hamburger
- Prepare stuffing per directions on box
- Boil zucchini, onions and carrots for 5 minutes, drain
- Mix in hamburger, soup and sour cream/Cheez Whiz
- Spread half the hamburger mixture into a casserole or cake pan
- Spread the stuffing as a second layer
- Spread the rest of the hamburger mixture on top
- Cover and back for 45 minutes

The Journey to the Buffalo



Levi Thortvedt wrote the story of his family's journey from Houston County in southeastern Minnesota to what became the "Buffalo River Settlement" in Clay County as a serial for the Moorhead Daily News in 1938. This month we'll join them on the third day of the journey: Saturday, May 21, 1870.

We were informed by a generous fellow that there was a good camping place two miles west of Rochester on a high knoll. In the evening when the campfires were going for the supper cooking, the lively sound of a violin was heard. It was Tarjei Muhle sitting on the wagon pole playing waltzes, polkas, and cotillions. This little stunt made me feel good and enthusiastic and livened up the whole party for that matter. We had our usual supper consisting of sweet milk mush and milk.

Sunday we didn't move on, as the sheep and cattle needed rest and to fill up good on grass. Some of the boys went down to Rochester, only two miles away, to spend part of the day. I will never forget this camping place where we could see for miles, especially to the east and to the south.

A Brief History of Veteran's Day

November 11th was originally called "Armistice Day" and it commemorated the end of World War I at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918.

In 1954, after both World War II and the Korean War, it was decided that the date should include all veterans, and the name of the holiday was changed to "Veteran's Day."

In 1968, a law was passed to make sure most holidays created 3-day week-ends. Because of the history and meaning of November 11th, the holiday was returned to its actual date in 1978 and has been celebrated on that date, wherever it falls during the week, ever since.

The difference between Memorial Day and Veteran's Day? Memorial Day honors those who died in service to their country or as a result of injuries incurred during battle. It has become common for all deceased veterans to be recognized on Memorial Day. Veteran's Day is set aside to thank and honor all veterans, especially those still living, who served honorably in the military during times of both war and peace.
