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#### **From Pastor Bruce**

We find ourselves in the darkest month of the year. What is interesting is that one prone to dark moods, namely Martin Luther,

would become upbeat even bouyant during Advent. I believe this was due to his faith and imagination. The seasons of the church year were not some abstract human creations but living reenactments of the original events for Luther. No wonder Luther's mood lifted this time of year. He was celebrating again the incarnation, Immanuel, God with us. We are no longer bumping along in darkness alone and without hope. God has intervened in subtle yet powerful ways through His Son Jesus Christ born as a baby for you and for me, in the most humble of circumstances. I commend to you this following excerpt provided by Gordon Conwell Seminary. I hope it is as edifying to you as it has been to me and that this Advent and Christmas would be a blessing to you and yours:

In the theological tumult that was Martin Luther's life, the great reformer seemed to be heartened each year by the great festivals of the church, particularly Advent and Christmas. The man who "invented" the Protestant parsonage was also sustained by a blazing sense of humor and a happy home life. It was open house all year in the large converted monastery at the east end of Wittenberg where Luther, his wife Katie, and their six children lived, along with numerous students who stayed there as well. One of them wrote that as Christmas approached, Luther grew increasingly cheerful: "All his words and songs and thoughts concerned the incarnation of our Lord. Then he sighed and said, 'Oh, we poor people that we should be so cold and indifferent to this great joy that has been given us. For this is indeed the greatest gift, which far exceeds all else that God has created. Yet we believe so sluggishly, even though the angels proclaim and preach and sing, and their lovely song sums up the whole Christian faith,

for 'Glory to God in the highest' is the very heart of worship."

Luther's writings contain a multitude of references to Advent and Christmas. The following excerpt comes from a sermon on the Nativity that he preached in 1530:

If Christ had arrived with trumpets and lain in a cradle of gold, his birth would have been a splendid affair. But it would not be a comfort to me. He was rather to lie in the lap of a poor maiden and be thought of little significance in the eyes of the world. Now I can come to him. Now he reveals himself to the miserable in order not to give any impression that he arrives with great power, splendor, wisdom, and aristocratic manners. But upon his return on that Day, when he will oppose the high and the mighty, it will be different. Now he comes to the poor, who need a Savior, but then he will come as a Judge against those who are persecuting him now.

May God continue to Bless you all.

#### Recipe of the Month

## Recipe of the Month Rullepølse

from the Norwegian-American Weekly



#### **Ingredients**

- 2 ½ lbs beef flank steak, butterflied (ask the butcher)
- 2 half-inch thick pork steaks
- 1 tbsp salt
- 1 tsp pepper
- 1 tsp ground ginger
- ½ tsp ground cloves
- ½ tsp sugar
- 1 medium onion, minced
- Beef bouillon

#### **Directions**

- Open flank steak to form rectangle, shiny side down.
   Pound to even thickness.
- Remove bones & gristle from pork, pound to even thickness.
- Mince onion, set aside

#### Recipe of the Month

- Mix dry seasonings, except bouillion
- Sprinkle 1/3 seasonings onto steak and rub into the meat
- Sprinkle 1/3 onions onto seasoned surface of steak
- Place pork steaks over onions
- Sprinkle remaining seasonings & onions onto pork steak
- With the grain of the meat lengthwise, firmly roll the meat away from you. Tuck in stray ends.
- To close, sew the final flap of meat to the roll. Tie a string around the meat lengthwise. Place the meat in a clean nylon knee-high and tie a knot in the end.
- Pierce the meat roll with a fork to prevent bursting.
- Place in pan, cover with water and add bouillion based on number of cups of water in pan
- Bring to a boil and then simmer slowly for 2 ½ to 3 hours (do NOT boil constantly)
- Place meat in flat pan and place a cutting board over the top, weighed down (e.g., with soup cans) to press out excess moisture and shape the meat into an oval.
- Press in refrigerator for 12 hours.
- Remove nylon, string, and all stitches
- Slice meat into thin slices

# Three Services on Christmas?

In the earliest Christian

days in Norway, people attended church three times at Christmas! The first service was a vigil that ended at midnight, which was believed to be the hour of Jesus' birth. This first service was also believed to represent the era before Christ's grace was known, so it was performed in darkness.

The second service was held at dawn, and represented the time when, although Christ was not yet among men, the prophets had foretold his coming and believers anxiously awaited his arrival (the coming of the light).

The daytime service, held at midday, celebrated the grace brought by Jesus' birth – destroying the darkness and bringing eternal light and life.

#### Bits and Pieces

After the Reformation, the midnight service was abolished. A shortage of ministers meant that only one service could be held in most churches on Christmas. In some places the pastor had to cover so many miles to reach the churches in his parish that even one service in each congregation on Christmas Day was impossible. Christmas was officially extended to include December 26<sup>th</sup> and many communities held their Christmas services on that day.

December 26 is still an official holiday in Norway, and in America many Norwegian congregations (including Concordia) recognized this "Old Country" tradition by holding their community celebrations and children's programs the day after Christmas.


## Why not *Kristmesse* in Norway?

In Viking days, the winter solstice celebration was called Jòl. When Haakon the Good (920-960) introduced Christianity, he decided to combine the Old Norse celebration of *Jòl* with the Christian observance of *Kristmesse*. Haakon outlawed animal sacrifice and other "heathen" practices associated with the ancient celebration, and traditional toasts to the Viking gods were replaced with toasts to Jesus and the Virgin Mary.

Haakon renounced Christianity on his deathbed, and it would be decades before it gained a real foothold in Norway. The name *Kristmesse* never caught on, and the Old Norse name for the winter solstice celebration (which was also celebrated in Great Britain as yule) has become synonymous with the celebration of Jesus' birth in Scandinavia.

### Where did lutefisk come from?



Legend has it that the Vikings attacked a village and burned down the wooden stacks where the residents were drying cod. Water was poured on the fire to douse the flames. A few days later, as people were rummaging through the rubble, they found the cod had softened amidst the ash and water (i.e., lye). They boiled it and found it not only edible but quite tasty. And thus was lutefisk born!




