

We are approaching the season of Pentecost, which Luther understood as the birthday of the Church. The following description is of from the online encyclopedia Wikipedia:

The biblical narrative of Pentecost, where the 11 Disciples of Christ (Acts 1:13, 26), along with about 109 other individuals (Acts 1:15), including many women, among whom was Mary the mother of Jesus (Acts 1:14), received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit in the Upper Room, is given in the second chapter of the Book of Acts. As recounted in Acts 2:1–6:

"And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak with other languages, as the Spirit gave them utterance. And there were dwelling at Jerusalem Jews, devout men, out of every nation under heaven. Now when this was noised abroad, the multitude came together, and were confounded, because that every man heard them speak in his own language."

While those on whom the Spirit had descended were speaking in many languages, the Apostle Peter stood up with the eleven and proclaimed to the crowd that this event was the fulfillment of the prophecy ("I will pour out my spirit"). In Acts 2:17, it reads: "'And in the last days,' God says, 'I will pour out my spirit upon every sort of flesh, and your sons and your daughters will prophesy and your young men will see visions and your old men will dream dreams." Acts 2:41 then reports: "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls."

Peter stated that this event was the beginning of a continual outpouring that would be available to all believers from that point on, Jews and Gentiles alike. (Acts 2:39)

Location of the first Pentecost:

Traditional interpretation holds that the Descent of the Holy Spirit took place in the Upper Room, or Cenacle, while celebrating the day of Pentecost (Shavuot). The Upper Room was first mentioned in Luke 22:12-13 ("And he shall shew you a large upper room furnished: there make ready. And they went, and found as he had said unto them: and they made ready the passover."). This Upper Room was to be the location of the Last Supper and the institution of Holy Communion. The next mention of an Upper Room is in Acts 1:13-14, the continuation of the Luke narrative, authored by the same biblical writer. Here the disciples and women wait and they gave themselves up to constant prayer: "And when they were come in, they went up into an upper room, where abode both Peter, and James, and John, and Andrew, Philip, and Thomas, Bartholomew, and Matthew, James the son of Alphaeus, and Simon Zelotes, and Judas the brother of James. These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication, with the women, and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with his brethren." Then the greatest event in history with exception of Jesus' Resurrection, took place in Acts 2:1-2, "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting." "They" refers to the aforementioned disciples, though some think it includes the women. The "place" referring to the same Upper Room where these persons had "continued with one accord in prayer and supplication."

Memorial Day

Memorial Day started as an event to honor soldiers who had died during the American Civil War. In 1868, General John A. Logan called for a day of remembrance on May 30 and coined the name Decoration Day. He chose this date because it was not the anniversary of any specific battle. On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield gave a speech at Arlington to over 5,000 people, and afterwards those in attendance decorated all 20,000 graves of Union and Confederate soldiers buried there.

Many places in both the North and the South claimed to be the first place to celebrate Memorial Day. In 1966, Congress and President Johnson declared that Waterloo, New York was the first in the nation to institute a yearly remembrance. Waterloo began honoring its Civil War dead and decorating their graves on May 5, 1866, as part of an existing community festival.

By 1890, Memorial Day was an official holiday in every state. After World War I the remembrance was expanded to include both men and women who had died fighting for their country in all wars. In 1968 Congress changed the date of Memorial Day to the last Monday in May, but many states retained the original May 30th date for Memorial Day for a number of years after that change took effect in 1971.

Over time, Memorial Day has become a day of parades and picnics. Families decorate the graves of all soldiers and family members, not just those who died in war. In December 2000 the "National Moment of Remembrance Act" specified that the nation should observe a moment of silence in honor of all those who have died in service to their country at 3:00 p.m. local time as a way to "put the memorial back in Memorial Day."

Each year since 2006, Concordia's Cemetery Association has sponsored a Memorial Day service and potluck during which all veterans buried at Concordia are honored. The tradition continues this year, with a service at 10 a.m. on Monday, May 27th. Please join us for this remembrance!

Recipe of the Month Stuffed Mushrooms

Ingredients

12 whole fresh mushrooms

- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1 tablespoon minced garlic
- 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cayenne pepper

Directions

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees). Spray a baking sheet with cooking spray.
- Clean mushrooms with a damp paper towel. Carefully break off stems. Chop stems extremely fine, discarding tough end of stems.
- Heat oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add garlic and chopped mushroom stems to the skillet. Fry until any moisture has disappeared, taking care not to burn garlic. Set aside to cool.
- When garlic and mushroom mixture is no longer hot, stir in cream cheese, Parmesan cheese, black pepper, onion powder and cayenne pepper. Mixture should be very thick.
- Using a little spoon, fill each mushroom cap with a generous amount of stuffing. Arrange the mushroom caps on prepared cookie
- Bake for 20 minutes in the preheated oven, or until the mushrooms are piping hot and liquid starts to form under caps.

From the files of the Historical and Cultural Society of Clay County...

Harold Bekkerus had a strange experience in the cyclone. He and Robert Johnk were driving along the grade between the Wm. Sprung and Halvor Tweten homestead where Flemming then lived. The boys were sucked out of their car and dragged along the graveled highway so their clothes were shredded and their bodies bruised and whipped with dirt. They noticed their car rolling over along the ditch and it was found later to have rolled over seven times. They were able at last to get up and walk to Flemming's place which was just a mile south of the church which was completely wrecked, blown to bits scattered far and wide, leaving only the cement basement. Sprung's barn, windmill and other buildings were destroyed or wrecked.


Memorial Day DVD Available
