Dear Members and Friends of Concordia:

Steven Covey in his bestselling book on leadership entitled "The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People," writes about what he considers to be the seven top character traits that not only make a person a good leader but also a fulfilled and content person.



Over the last two decades the themes of this book have become a part of many curricula throughout universities and even in leadership studies in the military. I would like to refer to one of them and place it in a little different context than Covey did. Herein lies the key to Jesus' promise to us, "I have come to give you life and life in all it's fullness."

"Begin with the End in Mind"

If you are planning a long road trip, say a family vacation, it may be a good idea to adhere to this habit. Imagine the potential for familial mutiny should the vacation organizer, let's say the father, be perceived as having no destination in mind after a few days of driving, but is simply selecting routes at random. Even the most spontaneous people would eventually become frustrated by this meandering. Having a clear sense of what the destination is and planning backwards for the most enjoyable, safe and efficient way to get there would be considered by most a reasonable policy. In general, trip preparation and implementation should be based on having the route correspond with the destination. This make sense in many other areas of life from career selection to retirement planning. It also makes sense existentially. Knowing our eternal destiny, knowing what happens to us after death, having some inkling of what that existence is going to be like for the life after this one will likely inform how we live out our lives in the here and now. If our expectations for what is to come are vague or non-existent, chances are we will expend great energy intentionally NOT thinking about the end.

This is the premise of Ernest Becker's book "The Denial of Death." Unfortunately, it is a life which more and more Americans are choosing to live as one generation after another is slowly sliding away from weekly attendance at Christian worship. The consequence of this change in "habits" is that the historical event of

Christ's resurrection has moved from being an historical event integrated into the daily life and world view of the individual to being at best a concept or at worst a myth comparable to the existence of the Easter Bunny; both simply quaint stories with no historical or personal relevance.

Beginning each day with not only THE end but also OUR end in mind is not some morbid fixation on death but the opposite; it is focusing our attention on the rock solid assurance that our final destination will be a good one - full of joy, not a black void or some nebulous, ill-defined existence. As each generation of Americans is increasingly trading in the incarnate reality of Jesus' death and resurrection story for other lesser stories, they are trading in confident hope for the best thing that could ever happen to them life eternal with God and with those that have died in the faith - for simply a pipe dream, wishful thinking that maybe there is something out there beyond this life. More often than not this self-created "spirituality", whatever the spirituality may be, will evaporate when the individual is confronted with the cruel reality of their own mortality, hence the ongoing human project of denying mortality for an increasing number of Americans. The end result is that more and more people are living life in a daily attempt to deny that their

existence will be utterly vanquished when their hearts beat their last. They cannot face the terror that all hopes, dreams, relationships literally dead end once they breathe their last breath. When the end of life is eternal death then all of life is pointless and devoid of meaning.

Steven Covey's point applies directly; if our end is ambiguous then our daily existence up until that end, will be lived in a vain attempt to not succumb to quiet despair. We are one car accident, one heart attack away from having our life journey ended by driving off a cliff into an eternal abyss of non-existence (at best).

Thankfully as Christians we have been guaranteed through God's grace, extended to us through Jesus' death and resurrection, that our journey's end will be far better than anything we have ever experience in the journey itself. By immersing ourselves in the rich biblical Easter narratives, by regularly experiencing the infusion of new life as we gather with fellow believers and receive the gift of forgiveness and a restored relationship with God, we are put "back on track" onto the road that will conclude with a wonderful destination.

Our lives are not one of aimless meanderings, pointless wanderings. Easter is not following rabbit trails but is a pilgrimage

with a definite beginning and a wonderful end and a God that promises to journey with us through his Holy Spirit along the entire way.

In conclusion, I leave you with one Christian author's vision of what the end of the journey looked like from his perspective: "I believe that the second best-selling set of books, behind the Bible, of the last half century, has been J.R.R. Tolkein's Trilogy, 'The Lord of the Rings.' I have read this epic tale of courage, perseverance and hope, against all odds, several times. When it seems that all the efforts of the forces for good have failed, that the world is destined to be overrun by the forces of evil and that the last battle will conclude in a final defeat which will cast all civilization into eternal bondage and darkness.

PIPPIN, one of the main characters, turns to Gandalf, one of the tireless champions for good, and laments in despair: I didn't think it would end this way.

GANDALF: End? No, the journey doesn't end here. Death is just another path, one that we all must take. The grey rain-curtain of this world rolls back, and all turns to silver glass, and then you see it.

PIPPIN: What? Gandalf? See what?

GANDALF: White shores, and beyond, a far green country under a swift sunrise.

PIPPIN: Well, that isn't so bad."

GANDALF: (smiling peacefully as the enemy prepares its final assault) No. No, it isn't."

For we who have been claimed by Christ, death is never the end but is simply the gate to a realm that is far better than anything we have known or could hope to imagine. The journey may be uncertain, ambiguous, perhaps even painful, but the end will be awesome."

Let us journey joyfully and confidently together with our Savior as we gather weekly around his Word and his meal that keep us on track and "give us life and life in all its fullness" all the way to our journey's end and beyond.

Recipe of the Month

Recipe of the Month Easy Candy Crunch Pie

Ingredients

Crust

24 Oreo cookies

1/4 cup melted butter

Filling

- 2 pkgs instant chocolate pudding
- 2 cups cold milk
- 3 oz. baker's semi-sweet chocolate
- 18 oz. tub of whipped topping
- 2 chocolate covered toffee bars, chopped

Directions

Crust

- Add Oreo cookies to a food processor or blender to create coarse crumbs
- Pour crumbs in a bowl and add melted butter. Mix well.
- Press crumbs into sides and bottom of pie pan
- Refrigerate for at least one hour before filling.



Recipe of the Month

Filling

- Whisk together pudding and milk in a bowl
- Microwave 2 oz. of chocolate on medium for about 1 minute.
 Chocolate should be almost melted. Stir until completely melted
- Stir in 1 cup pudding. Pour into crust.
- Add half the whipped topping and all but 3 TB of toffee to the remaining pudding. Spread evenly over pudding layer in crust.
- Top with remaining whipped topping.
- Sprinkle remaining toffee on cool whip
- Melt the remaining chocolate. Use a fork to drizzle it over the pie.
- Refrigerate for at least 1 hour.


