It is easy for Christians, especially Lutherans, to have a dim view of the universal necessity of good works. We think about Jesus who said: "Don't waste your energy striving for perishable food like that. Work for the food that sticks with you, food that nourishes your lasting life, food the Son of Man provides. He and what he does are guaranteed by God the Father to last."



We think about Martin Luther who staked his very life on the fact that we are saved not by works but by God's mercy. One of the interesting dichotomies in the life of Martin Luther is that he said that while we are not saved BY works we are saved, in part, TO work and to do good work. It is intriguing that the one who advocated justification by grace through faith should have such a high esteem for productive work that he said to his parish not to send the brightest young people into ordained ministry but into public service, which for him meant work that would be good for the common good, the most people. He believed that Christians and non-Christians alike were created by God for the purpose of making society as a whole better:

more just, more compassionate and more life giving to all. Luther believed if one were called to be a farmer one should be the best farmer one could be. If a person were called to be a garbage collector one should be the best garbage collector one could be. No vocation, not even ordained ministry, was a higher calling than another.

Luther had a deep appreciation for the importance of every one doing good work, not because they had to in order to earn salvation (or God' favor) but out of gratitude for having been saved by Jesus Christ.

Luther thought highly of the words of the Apostle Paul when he writes: "Work hard, but not just to please your masters when they are watching. As slaves of Christ, do the will of God with all your heart. Work with enthusiasm, as though you were working for the Lord rather than for people" (Ephesians 6:6-7).

Luther would surely have celebrated Labor Day should that have been available during his time as would the author of good work Himself.

Burton Kragnes 1937-2014

Burton C. Kragnes, 77, of Detroit Lakes, MN, died on Tuesday, July 15, 2014 at Essentia Health in Fargo, ND.

Burton Conrad Kragnes was born on July 15, 1937 to Alvin O. and Adeline (Rosman) Kragnes at St. John's Hospital in Fargo. He grew up

on the family farm in Georgetown, MN and graduated from Moorhead High School in 1955. Burt then attended NDSU and graduated in 1959 with a degree in mechanical engineering.

Burt enlisted in the Army in 1959, going from the Army Reserves to lieutenant and finally captain.

On December 29, 1960 Burt married Doris Johnson at Concordia Lutheran Church in Glyndon, MN and they made their home in Detroit, MI while he was still in the service. He was discharged from the Army in 1962. Burt then went to work as an engineer for IBM for the next 10 years. In 1972 he became self-employed, first in the business of constructing parade floats and

secondly, in 1989, as the owner of a fishing resort on Lake Lida. Burt and Doris ran the resort until 2008.

Burt enjoyed fishing and hunting, but most of all he loved spending time with his family, especially his grandchildren. He also had many fond memories of time spent with his brother, Gene.

Burt is survived by his wife, Doris, his three daughters and one son, Renee (Timothy) Schmitt, Rochester, MN, Kirstin (Paul) Burton, Rochester, Brent (Angie) Kragnes, Rapid City, SD, and Deidra Kragnes, New York City, his sisters Lorna (Burton) Rockstad, Ada, MN, Orpha (Kjell) Hoelstad, Kragnes, MN and Sylvia (Wally) Teigen, Moorhead, and his 8 grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his parents and his brother, Eugene Kragnes.

A Memorial Service was held on Friday, July 18, 2014 at 1:00 P.M. at Concordia Lutheran Church, Glyndon, MN. Friends and family gathered from noon to 1:00 at the church. Burial was in Concordia Lutheran Church cemetery.

Concordia Church Seeks Pastor

Rev H. J. Wickre to preach farewell sermon Sunday, August 26

Candidate for pastorship to preach at Concordia Church Sunday

Rev H J Wickre, pastor of five churches in the Glyndon, Buffalo River and Averill districts, was in the city today and announced that he had resigned from the pastorship of the churches and will preach his farewell sermon at Concordia Church on Sunday, August 26 at 10:30 a.m. At that time there will also be confirmation and communion services. Rev. Mr. Wickre has found it necessary to resign owing to failing health and will leave for Martell Wis, to rest for awhile before taking up the work again. Rev. Mr. Wickre came to the Glyndon neighborhood on May 20, six years ago, and during his pastorate has built up his charges in both spiritual and material ways. He has a large number of friends in Moorhead as well as Glyndon, who hope for a speedy recovery of full vigor and health. The five congregations of which he is pastor are: Concordia Lutheran Church

northeast of Moorhead, the North Buffalo Church; Scandia church, north of Averill; the Lutheran church in Glyndon, and Zion church, two miles east of Glyndon.

Services will be held next Sunday, August 19, at Concordia church when a candidate for the pastorate of the churches, Rev. Osmund Johnson of Fertile will preach. There will be no services at any of the other four churches Sunday, and those churches are invited to attend at Concordia church. The services will start at 11 a.m. in the Norwegian language, and in the evening at 8 o'clock in English, to which the young people are especially invited.

Pastor M. G. Haugen was selected to succeed Pastor Wickre. He served from 1924-1929.
