Most every Sunday and most every newsletter, I dedicate my message to what the gospel means for us and individuals and what it means for us as a church family at Concordia Lutheran. While this is important and will continue to be my primary goal for the future, it is good to take our stock in what it means for us to be connected to and partners with other congregations of the Lutheran tradition. In this and future issues of the Concordia newsletter, I would like to express the closest jurisdictional expression of Lutheranism for us; it is the Northwestern Minnesota Synod of the ELCA.

This season of Easter we looked at the singular historical event of the resurrection of Jesus Christ and then spent the remainder of the season of Easter focusing in on what this means for our identity as individuals and as a congregation. The season of Pentecost started with the singular event of God sending the Holy Spirit upon his disciples, forming the Church, and then sending to Church to reach out to the world with the saving message of the resurrected Jesus Christ.



In Easter we learn who we are, individually and

corporately; during the season of Pentecost we learn more in depth about our identity but also learn what difference this makes; in short what to do with this new creation God has worked and continues to work in our lives as individual Christians as well as our lives as part of the broader Church of Jesus Christ.

Recipe of the Month Betty McCollum's Turkey, Sweet Potato and Wild Rice Hotdish

Winner of the 2015 Minnesota congressional delegation hotdish competition



Ingredients

1 lb ground Turkey 2 large bunches of kale leaves 3 cups cooked wild rice ¹/₂ vellow onion, diced 2 cloves garlic, minced 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon ¹/₂ tablespoon red pepper flakes 1tsp paprika 1tbsp butter 4 oz crimini mushrooms, sliced 1/4 cup chicken stock 1/2 cup milk 1/8 cup cream ¹/₂ teaspoon thyme, minced 1 package frozen sweet potato tater tots

Directions

- Brown ground turkey in pan with salt and pepper, set aside.
- Add kale leaves and 1 cup water to large saucepan and cover, stirring occasionally. Do this until water has evaporated and kale has wilted. Remove from saucepan and set aside.
- On medium heat, add mushrooms, onions, and 2 TB olive oil to saucepan. Do not stir and let mushrooms brown and begin to carmelize. After 5-6 minutes, stir, add salt and pepper to taste, let sit another 5-6 minutes.
- Add kale, butter, thyme, garlic, cinnamon, paprika, red pepper flakes. Cook additional 1-2 minutes.
- Add milk, cream, and chicken stock. Reduce heat and cover, stirring occasionally until mixture thickens. Add flour if necessary.
- Preheat oven to 425.
- Combine all ingredients in 9 X 9 pan, Top with sweet potato tots and bake until tots brown, about 35 minutes.

- We have a heart for God's Mission to redeem creation. The synod is the hands and feet of God's mission. As Christ followers led by God's Holy Spirit we...
- join in that work to bring hope and healing, reconciliation and redemption to the world.
- pray and are guided by the message of scripture to discern God's will in NWMN synod.
- live out the Greatest Commandment of Matthew 22, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and mind ... and you shall love your neighbor as yourself."
- live out the Great Commission in Matthew 28 to "Go therefore and make disciple of all nations."
- are missional pioneers, led out of our comfort zones by the Holy Spirit into the wilderness of the communities and contexts God has called us to serve.
- are not a "settled" church comfortable with the status quo, but rather a sent church that sees itself as on the move for the sake of the gospel and the sake of the world. (Rick Rouse and Craig VanGelder, Field Guide for the Missional Congregation, Augsburg Fortress 2008, 25).

Our Mission Field

Our "mission field" is right outside our front door. Every member of the synod is a missionary. Our challenge is to reclaim the Christian practice of sharing our faith in both word and deed. We can no longer expect the unchurched to come to us through the front doors of our sanctuaries, we must go to them. We must take the church public and to reach the spiritually needs of our communities. This is our single greatest opportunity to share the good news of Jesus.

Northwestern Minnesota for generations has been 'Lutherland'. Most small towns have several Lutheran congregations with a strong sense of intergenerational community and caring. The identity of many of our rural churches is rooted in Lutheran Northern European immigrant story. Among the elders their faith goes deep into their bones. Among younger generations there is a vibrant faith in action.



What Difference Does Synod Ministry Make?

Missional

Supporting one another in evangelical mission development.

Leadership

A strong church require effective leadership, both ordained and lay. Jesus devoted major energy to the leadership formation of his disciples. So must we. If you reflect on synod ministry, you notice the prominence of leadership formation, support, development and accountability. These are critical functions to the health of the church.

Relationships

The church is at its best when gifts, burdens and mission are shared. Synod ministry oversees and tends the important relationships, networks and formal structures of our ministry together, helping congregations do together what could not be done well alone.

Accountability

Synodical ministries of decision-making, leadership support and development, congregational support, and extended ministry structured around the mutual are accountability of the community of faith. Decisionmaking is democratic; leaders are elected by their congregations or appointed by the synod council or the synod assembly.

Our constitutions bind us to a confession of faith based on Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions. In this way we choose to evaluate and discern our ministry by its faithfulness to Jesus Christ and his Gospel of Salvation.
