At Concordia Lutheran and at the protestant worship at the Happy Hooligans we will acknowledge this event in a special liturgy and hymnody. We do this not in a spirit of vindictiveness or desire for revenge, but as an act of gratitude to all who made the ultimate sacrifice rushing towards the Towers to fulfill their mission to serve and protect their fellow Americans. We all know where we were when this attack took place. All our lives changed to one degree or another as a result of this hate filled assault done in the name of religion. Feel free to pass the word on to your neighbors.

As the 15th anniversary of September 11 approaches, a community group led we are urging citizens, businesses, churches, and other religious institutions, civic clubs, and government units to remember the events of that tragic day.

We are asking each of you to remember the men, women, and children who were killed, and look for ways to ensure that each and every one of them is not forgotten, while also reinforcing and carrying forward the spirit of unity that followed the attacks.

From Pastor Bruce

Each of us can take time to thank our first responders, law enforcement and firefighters. Few remember that in the Twin Towers 2,196 civilians died and 418 first responders died trying to save them.

While the main effort is observing a moment of silence or prayer on September 11th at any or all of the following Eastern Daylight Savings times marking key moments on 9/11.

8:46 a.m.: Hijackers deliberately crash Flight 11 into the North Tower (1 WTC).

9:03 a.m.: Hijackers deliberately crash United Airlines Flight 175 into the South Tower (2 WTC).

9:37 a.m.: Hijackers deliberately crash American Airlines Flight 77 into the Pentagon.

9:59 a.m.: The South Tower (2 WTC) collapses.

10:03 a.m.: After learning of the other attacks, passengers on United Airlines Flight 93 launched a counterattack on hijackers aboard their plane to try to seize control of the aircraft. In response, the hijackers crash the plane into an empty field near Shanksville, Pa.

10:28 a.m.: The North Tower (1 WTC) collapses. The 16-acre World Trade Center site is in ruins, with collateral damage affecting all adjacent properties and streets.

From Pastor Bruce

We recommend lowering the American Flag to half-staff, with consideration of doing it at 8:46 a.m. to mark the moment when Flight 11 struck the North Tower at the WTC.

Another suggestion is to toll bells on September 11 at 8:46 a.m. or at each of the times listed above. Of course a prayer would be appropriate as well.

September 11 has now emerged as the single largest day of charitable engagement. Since 2011, participation in 9/11 Day has grown every year, exceeding 40 million participants annually and you can do your part by volunteering in your community.

We are urging you to remember the day by making the commitment to volunteer. There are numerous ways to participate in the annual commemoration and one of the most powerful is performing acts of service in our communities in remembrance of the victims of 9/11.

When you choose to commemorate the anniversary of 9/11, you are playing an important part in memorializing those who were killed, honoring the sacrifices of the first responders, and remembering the spirit of unity that emerged in the aftermath of 9/11, something our Nation needs every day.

You can ensure that our Nation never forgets!



Easy Fruit Soup

2 3" cinnamon sticks

1 large apple, diced

1 12 oz can pitted dark cherries

1 12 oz pkg frozen raspberries

Directions

- Simmer rice & cinnamon in water for 20 minutes. Discard rice and cinnamon
- Add diced apple, simmer 5-10 minutes
- Add cherries and raspberries. Bring to a boil and immediately remove from heat.
- Let stand about ½ hour before refrigerating

Ceremony performed Sunday evening in Concordia Lutheran Church

Before the altar of Concordia Lutheran Church Sunday evening, vows were spoken by Miss Mae E. Thortvedt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Thortvedt, Moorhead, and Kenneth J. Koester, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. R. Koester, Sabin. The altar was banked with late garden flowers and greenery and lighted with white tapers in candelabra. Rev. C. B. Runsvold officiated.

A white chiffon gown fashioned with puffed sleeves and a flared floor length skirt was worn by the bride. Her fingertip veil was held in place with a wreath of orange blossoms that had been worn by her mother. The bridal bouquest was of bronze pompoms and salmon gladioli, tied with a bronze ribbon. Miss Olive Thortvedt, sister of the bride, was bridesmaid. Her gown was of silk chiffon and she carried yellow gladioli. Maurice Koester attended his brother. Ushers were Harold Johnk, cousin of the bride, and Lynn Anderson, Comstock. Misses Eva and Florence Thortvedt, Clarice Haukebo, L. E. Hammett, and Bob Hicktheir presented the nuptial music.

A reception followed the ceremony, flowers and candles again being used as decorations in the church parlors where the reception was held. Mr. and Mrs. Koester left on a wedding trip to Northern Minnesota and Canadian points. They will be at home near Comstock after September 15.
