


influence on my theology and preaching. I hope that you enjoy this passage. I'd like to thank Will McDavid for posting this quote online.

FORDE ON THE BOUND (RELIGIOUS) WILL AND FREEDOM

From Gerhard Forde's Where God Meets Man, one of the most grace-packed bits of Lutheran theology out there:



"It is in this theology of old versus new that we can see, finally, the reason for Luther's formulation of the problem of bondage and freedom. The old Adam is totally bound. No compromise is possible with him. To allow him a 'little bit' of freedom is to open the doors to the whole sticky attempt to combine grace with his fraudulent spiritual ambitions. It is to bind man to his self-imposed legalisms and reduce God to his helper. It is to reintroduce the insipid piety of the 'little bit.' There is absolutely no way to cure this old Adam, no way to allow him into the picture. He is 'totally depraved.' He must die. And that is just what the Gospel means. The cross and resurrection sounds his death knell. Almighty God moves onto the scene to reclaim his own

And so the gospel is the announcement and realization of total freedom. It is not a matter of little bits. God moves in Christ to raise up a new man – a completely free man – not just to do a partial repair job. When the old Adam is put to death one is set free from bondage to spiritual ambition, legalism, and tyranny. And Luther, for one, meant this quite literally. One is absolutely free. It is a total state."

Here is a drastic parting of the ways with a theology of glory. The Christ of the Cross *takes away* the possibility of doing something. The theologian of glory might be able to follow to the point of accepting the truth that Christ has fulfilled all things, but then that will have to be used as a motivational tool to make sure the law gets its due. The point is precisely that the power to do good comes only out of this wild claim that everything has *already* been done. The language has to break out into preaching. Never mind that when we look to ourselves we find no sign of good works. Never mind our fears and our anxieties. We are looking in the wrong place. Look to Christ! He has done it all. Nothing will be gained by trying to shore up the Old Adam. Christ leaves nothing for the Old Adam and Eve to do. The old can only be killed by the law, not given artificial respiration by recourse to it... To the theologian of the cross the language of grace and faith must be pushed absolutely to this length – until it kills the old and raises the new.





Recipe of the Month "Right to Bear Arms" Hotdish

Colin Peterson's winning entry 2017 MN Congressional Delegation Hotdish Off



Ingredients

1.5 pounds of lean ground bear meat or other ground meat (wild game preferred)

1 large yellow onion, diced

1 leek, chopped

1 teaspoon cracked black pepper

1 stick butter

1 pound of frozen potato olés

10 ounce can of cream of celery soup

10 ounce can of cream of mushroom soup

8 sprigs of fresh marjoram, chopped

15 sprigs of fresh thyme, chopped

1 bunch of fresh chives, chopped

12 ounces of frozen French cut green beans

4 ounces sharp Cheddar, shredded

2 ounces aged Gouda, shredded

2 ounces Gruyere, shredded

½ can chow mein noodles

Directions

- Preheat oven to 425°F.
- Grease a hotdish pan using a stick of butter until well greased (don't use all the butter).
- Line the bottom of the pan with a solid layer of potato olés (you won't use the entire bag).
- Put the pan in the oven for 15 minutes to brown the potatoes.
- Melt a pad of butter in a cast iron skillet on medium high heat. Add onions and leek and sauté for three minutes. Put meat in the pan and use a spatula to break down the meat as it browns. Do not overcook. Season with cracked black pepper as you go.
- Remove browned potato olés from the oven and spread the meat mixture on top.
- Turn oven heat down to 375°F.
- In another bowl, mix both cream soups, marjoram, thyme, chives, and frozen green beans. Mix vigorously, then spread evenly over the potato and meat layers in the hotdish. Sprinkle cheddar atop it all. Cover the hotdish with aluminum foil and bake at 375°F for 35 minutes.
- Remove the foil, and sprinkle Gouda, Gruyère, and chow mein noodles atop the hotdish.
- Place back in oven, uncovered, and turn the heat up to 400°F for 25 minutes.
- Remove from oven. Let stand 10 minutes, if you can *bear* to wait.

May 29, 1926 Page One Headline: Lightening Kills J T Holte

John T. Holte, prominent farmer of the Kragnes vicinity, was instantly killed at 5:08 a.m. today when struck by a bolt of lightening while fishing from a boat with Nels Larson and Knud Sunde of the Kragnes district at Cotton Lake, 12 miles northeast of Detroit Lakes.

Sunde and Larson were stunned but not injured. With four other members of the party they brought the body into Detroit this morning.

Mr. Holte left for Cotton Lake on Friday afternoon with Larson, Sunde, Sever Rasmusson, Henry Olson, Alvin Kragnes, and Arthur Gorder, all farmers of the Kragnes district. The men camped out on the shores of Cotton Lake last night.

Mr. Larson reported to the *News* this morning that Holte, Sunde and himself went out fishing at 4 a.m. today, but took cover under trees on the shore when the rain began falling. When the rain stopped, the men again entered the boat and rowed to the fishing ground where they anchored. Mr. Holte's death occurred shortly after they anchored.

The deceased man's watch stopped at 5:08 a.m. Some money in his pocketbook was melted by the bolt.

Mr. Holte came to his present home in 1874 when four families drove up from Houston, Minn. to this district with ox teams, according to E. O. Studlien, one of the district's pioneers. The heads of the group were Targe Holte, John Holte's father, Michael Larson, O. T. Kiland, and A. O. Kragnes. John Holte was four years old at the time. He had lived on the home farm from that time until his death. His wife died about 1912. The only surviving relatives are a sister, Mrs. O. T. Kiland of Canada, a son Jacob, 21, and a daughter, Julia, both living at home.

The deceased had taken a prominent part in community projects. He was township assessor for many years. He was a strong supporter of all economic measures intended to benefit the farmer and served as a director from Clay County on the board of the Minnesota Potato Growers Exchange during the life of the exchange.

Mr. Holte was one of the organizers of the Farmers Elevator Company of Kragnes and has served as secretary of the company since its organization. He also assisted in the organization of the Farmers Elevator of Averill. At the recent Farmer-Labor convention held in Barnesville, Mr. Holte was one of the candidates nominated for state senator from this district to succeed A. A. Haagenson. He withdrew from the ballot in favor of N. H. Nelson of Dale.

June 1, 1926 Holte Services to be held Wednesday

Funeral services for John T. Holte, Clay County farmer who was killed by lightening while fishing at Cotton Lake Saturday, will be held Wednesday at 1 p.m. from the farm home near Kragnes and at 2 p.m. from the Concordia Lutheran Church. Rev. M. G. Holm will officiate and burial will be beside Mr. Holte's wife in the church cemetery.

Pallbearers will be friends of Mr. Holte who accompanied him on the fishing trip: N J Larson and Knud Sunde, who were stunned by the same bolt that killed Mr. Holte, Henry Olson, Arthur Gorder, Alvin Kragnes, and Severt Rasmusson.

May 9, 1931 Espeland Funeral Takes Place Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. Osten Espeland, 86, of Morken Township, will take place Tuesday at 2 p.m. at the Concordia Lutheran Church. Rev. C. B. Runsvold will be in charge and burial will be in the church cemetery.

Mrs. Espeland died Thursday at her home. She is survived by her husband, five children, and numerous other relatives.


