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"Life as struggle" comes to mind as an appropriate theme given the terrible weather our area has endured this spring, summer, this fall and, so far, this winter. "Life as struggle" is not a new theme. An entire philosophy was based on this theme in ancient Greece. The stoics understood that life was a struggle and the goal of life was through human effort (character) to rise above it until death ended this life for eternity.

Hopefully none of us have had our personal theologies influenced by the horrible the insurance industry moniker for natural disasters "an act of God". God is not a capricious or vindictive deity that rides around the heavenly realm armed with Zeus-like lightening bolts hurling them randomly nor with precision at earth. While the Old Testament is replete with references of God as a God of justice and even of wrath, it tempers the image of a righteous/perfect/removed God with images of God as a protecting shepherd and even as a loving father. Nonetheless, every encounter between humans and the divine (mostly God's messengers, is angels) is received with utter terror. If all we have is the Old Testament Jehovah as our God, it would be easy to conclude that this deity's "love" for us would certainly be overridden by the constraints of his justice, his righteousness and this could only lead to divine wrath as this deity looks upon the ongoing sinfulness and rebellion against his rule in the lives of all humans. Besides, this deity with few exceptions never

shows up, He sends his ambassadors. If all we had was the Old Testament God it would be reasonable to agree with insurance industry theology, that behind every terrible event stands a punishing and wrathful deity. If God is a loving parent he has a heavy hand that rules the household and his children with an iron hand. If God is loving he loves at a distance. He is aloof. He has no capacity for empathy as he is totally divine and we and his creation are the opposite. The Old Testament God has "no flesh in the game", so to speak.

The message of Advent, Christmas and now Epiphany (the season of the reveling of who the Divine really is) speak of a God incarnate (literally meaning in-fleshed). Advent speaks of his coming drawing upon Old Testament prophecies of God's doing a new thing on behalf of humanity. Christmas reveals the radical nature of that new thing with God becoming human, all human. Epiphany helps us understand who that incarnate God really is and who he can be in relationship to you and me.

The take home for us is that God has experienced first hand the fullness of our humanity at its weakest point: being born a helpless baby to a poor and publicly discredited teenage "adulteress". From the very beginning, even in the womb, God knows what it means to suffer what it means to be marginalized. In the incarnation God has demonstrated that in his son Jesus Christ, fully God yet fully man, he

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now has "flesh in the game."This is the message of Epiphany. God is anything but aloof, removed, uncaring. He is God with us, Emmanuel. Should we have any doubts about the sincerity of God's intent the upcoming season of Lent should dispel any lingering preconceptions.

To come full circle, life is full of struggle. Our ancestors mostly looked as life as little other than struggle, yet they kept the faith that God was with them in the midst of those struggles and would see them through this life and shepherd them into a better life where there is no suffering, no illness, no pain, no death.

This process was begun in the Incarnation, this season of Epiphany it will be revealed again to us again. Please join us at Concordia as we celebrate this revealing together. May our in-fleshed God bless you with his presence in your struggles and in the joys he has in store for you in this life and in the next.



Ingredients

1 lb. sausage6 eggs2 cups milk8 slices of breadButter1 tsp dried mustard1 tsp salt1 cup grated cheddar cheese

Directions

- Brown sausage, drain well and set aside to cool
- Butter one side of each slice of bread
- Cover bottom of 9X13 pan with bread, buttered side down
- In a large bowl, beat eggs
- Mix together eggs, milk, sausage, mustard, salt and cheddar cheese
- Pour into pan over bread
- Refrigerate overnight
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- Cook for 35-40 minutes

The remains of John Andrew Juve, 13 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alden Juve, arrived in Moorhead this morning from St. Paul, where the boy passed away in a hospital. He had been receiving treatment for a complication of diseases but this failed to save him. The family resided on a farm northeast of Dilworth for some years, but during the past year they have resided in Fargo. No plans have yet been made for the funeral as yet. All arrangements are in charge of the Leo Johnson Furniture Company, undertaking department.


Page Three Meet At Espeland Home
