

Week 3 – Murder – John 11:47-53

Jesus is accused of inspiring rebellion and the destruction of Israel;

he is accused of being in league with Satan, who is "a murderer

from the beginning" (John 8:44).

Week 4 – Associating with Tax Collectors and Prostitutes –

Mark 2:13-17

Jesus is accused of associating with tax collectors and prostitutes.

Week 5 – Stealing – Luke 23:1-5

Jesus is accused of forbidding the paying of taxes.




Veteran's Coffee Hour

Cool Ranch Pork Chops

Ingredients

6 boneless pork chops
½ cup ranch dressing
¼ cup grated onion
¼ cup grated green or red pepper
3 cups crushed Cool Ranch Doritos
Salt & Pepper

Directions

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- Crush Doritos in a large Ziploc bag
- In a shallow bowl, mix ranch dressing with onion and peppers; salt and pepper to taste

Judging Teams Awarded Honors

4-H Group Gets Good Ratings at Winter Shows

A judging team made up of 4-H members acquitted themselves admirably against both youth and adult teams at the Winter Shows in Crookston, county agent Daniel Peet announced today.

The 4-H team, composed of Kenneth Koester, Sabin, Gerald Pingree and Merle Maring, Georgetown, won a total of 1,798 points compared to 1,873 for the winning adult team. The youths took second place on beef and dairy judging, third on swine and sheep, and eighth on horses. Koester and Pingree placed first in sheep and beef judging, respectively, and the individuals placed as follows: xxxKoester, fourth; Pingree seventh; and Maring, 21st.

President's Day Monday, February 17, 2020

On the morning of February 11, 1861, the President-elect, Abraham Lincoln, together with his family and a small party of friends, left Springfield, Illinois, the home Lincoln would never see again, for

Washington DC. A large crowd had assembled at the train station to



bid Mr. Lincoln farewell. Aware of the grave state of the republic as he set out for the nation's capitol, the future and perhaps greatest president said:

"My friends - No one, not in my position, can appreciate the sadness I feel at this parting. To this people I owe all that I am. Here I have lived more than a

quarter of a century - here my children were born, and here one of them lies buried. I know not how soon I shall see you again. A duty devolves upon me which is, perhaps, greater than that which has devolved upon any other man since the days of Washington. He never would have succeeded except by the aid of Divine Providence, upon which he at all times relied. I feel that I cannot succeed without the same Divine aid which sustained him, and on the same Almighty Being I place my reliance for support - and I hope you, my friends, will all pray that I may receive that Divine assistance, without which I cannot succeed, but with which success is certain. Again I bid you an affectionate farewell."



Where Did Leap Year Come

From?

The original Roman calendar was based on the cycles of the moon. It had

304 days and 10 months – Martius, Aprilis, Maius, Junius, Quintilis, Sextilis, September, October, November and December. (The names of Quintilis-December were derived from Latin numbers 5 through 10).

The Romans eventually realized that a year should be based on the sun and not the moon. About 700 BCE the months of January and February were added, but this new calendar still had only 355 days. It didn't take long for the feast intended to celebrate the summer solstice to occur near the time of the winter solstice and vice versa!

In an attempt to make the months match the seasons, the Pontifex Maximus (high priest of Rome) was authorized to add an extra month (named Mercedonius) as needed. Leap years were considered to be unlucky. The priests were routinely bribed to make years longer or shorter for political, military, religious or personal reasons. It didn't solve the calendar problems. In 45 B.C. Julius Caesar took the advice of Cleopatra's astronomer and standardized the calendar to more accurately reflect the solar cycle. He added 10 days to what became known as the Julian calendar and added an extra day to February every 4 years, creating the basic leap year rule. The month originally named Sixtus became July to honor Julius Caesar.

The calendar was still not exactly right, so Caesar Augustus cancelled leap year for 17 years to bring the calendar into alignment with the vernal and autumnal equinoxes. The month of Sextilis was renamed in his honor.

It takes 365 days, 5 hours and 48 minutes for the earth to rotate around the sun. The Julian calendar added one too many days about every 128 years, so Pope Gregory III removed 10 days from 1582. His Gregorian calendar offered a permanent solution by decreeing that leap years should occur whenever the year is divisible by 4, except when that year is evenly divisible by 100 but not by 400. That is why 1600 and 2000 were leap years; 1700, 1800, and 1900 were not.

Protestant countries and their colonies were slow to adopt the new "Catholic" calendar, and both the Julian and Gregorian calendars were used in Europe for almost 200 years. England and its colonies didn't make the switch until 1752. Today we still use the Gregorian calendar.
