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As we wait, watch and practice social isolation we are behaving in ways that are counter-intuitive. During times of duress our heritage is to gather with our



neighbors to face adversity together. There is no better expression of that than the heritage of our rural communities and rural churches. It is precisely this heritage that makes it so hard to hunker down, intentionally separating ourselves from our brothers and sisters in Christ. Intellectually we know our actions to be responsible, even patriotic, but it still does not make it easy.

We are not the first Lutherans to face the trials which epidemics place and communities and upon churches. In 1527 the plague, far deadlier than the Coronavirus, was ravaging cities throughout Germany including Wittenburg where Luther lived. The words he spoke then are good words for us to consider today: "Use medicine; take potions which can help you; fumigate house, yard, and street; shun persons and places wherever your neighbor does not need your presence or has recovered." What motivated Luther was not self preservation but love for his neighbor. For us as for him, sometimes the best thing we can do is stay away, which is why churches are dark. Sometimes the loving thing is not an easy thing.

In the midst of these times we remember the portion of the petition we prayed during our first two Lenten services: that God save us from famine and pestilence (LBW Service of the Word).

I leave you with the following from Luther: "In closing, we admonish and plead with you in Christ's name to help us with your prayers to God so that we may do battle with word and precept against the real and spiritual pestilence of Satan in his wickedness with which he now poisons and defiles the world."

May God keep us faithful in prayer, in hope and in faith during these trying times.

**MRS. STUDLIEN DIES
IN KRAGNES**

**75-Year Old Woman Had Lived on Farm
Near Kragnes Since 1889**

Mrs. Ingeborg Studlien, 75, Kragnes Township, a resident of this vicinity since 1889, died at 6:55 p.m. Wednesday at her farm home.

Born November 28, 1864 in Telemarken, Norway, she came to the United States in the fall of 1885, going directly to Crookston. She was married to Edwin O. Studlien on December 9, 1889, in Concordia Church, nine miles north of Watt's Siding, and came with her husband to a farm near Moorhead, where she has lived ever since.

Her husband died in 1936. She was a member of the Lutheran church.

She leaves two sons, Olaf and Edwin H., at the farm home; two daughters, Mrs. Paul Skarstad, Adams ND and Mrs. C I. Ramstad, 611 Fourth Avenue South; two brothers, Hans Roholt, Esmond ND and John Roholt, Crookston; and one sister, Mrs. Marie Vaa, Oslo, Norway, and four grandchildren.

A group of Moorhead Boy Scouts attended funeral services in a body this afternoon at Trinity Lutheran Church for Russell Osmundson, 16, who was killed at Roseburg, Oregon, last week. Russell, a former student at Moorhead State Teachers College training school, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Osmundson.

He died of injuries he received when he was struck by an automobile as he was walking with his brother to a Boy Scout meeting.

Pall bearers were James and John McCann, James Juve, Raymond Grover, and Walter Specht. Burial was in the family lot at Concordia Church Cemetery.

Recipe of the Month Parmesan Peas & Potatoes

Great served with ham!



Ingredients

- 6-10 small red potatoes, cubed
- 16 oz. bag frozen peas
- ¼ cup butter
- ¼ cup flour
- 1 cup milk
- 1 tbsp onion powder
- ½ cup shredded parmesan cheese
- ¼ cup grated onion
- ¼ cup grated green pepper
- Salt & pepper

Directions

- Fill large saucepan ³/₄ full of water. Add about 3 TB salt and bring to a boil.
- Add frozen peas.
- When boiling again, add potatoes and reduce heat to medium.
- Cook until potatoes are tender – check them beginning at about 12 minutes. You don't want them falling apart!
- Drain potatoes and peas and set aside.
- In the same saucepan at medium heat, melt butter.
- Add flour and onion powder.
- As flour-butter mixture begins to thicken, start whisking in milk a little at a time.
- Whisk until sauce is thick and creamy. If too thick, add a little more milk.
- Stir in parmesan cheese and let it melt. Whisk until cheese is mixed into sauce.
- Add potatoes and peas back into saucepan. Stir gently to combine and rewarm potatoes and peas. Salt & pepper to taste.
- Grate fresh onion and green pepper together.
- Pour potato/pea mixture into serving dish.
- Garnish with shredded cheese, grated onion & pepper.

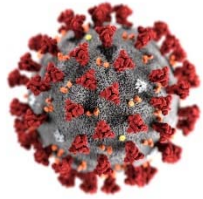

COVID-19

There are still many unknowns when it comes to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) that is affecting all our daily lives. What is known is that it spreads from person to person and those with compromised immune systems and those 60 and over are at the greatest risk for serious complications from this flu-like disease.

The “flu rules” apply when it comes to protecting yourself:

- Cough or sneeze into the crook of your elbow
- Wash your hands thoroughly and often. Along with normal handwashing before meals or after using the bathroom, wash them after being in a public place/touching a public surface, after blowing your nose, sneezing or coughing.
- Avoid touching your face with your hands.

Especially if COVID-19 is known to be in your community, keep a distance of 3-6 feet between yourself and others. Do not shake hands, hug or kiss people you don’t live with, including family members.

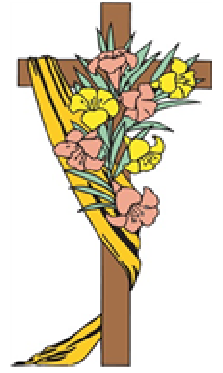
Social Distancing: What does it mean?

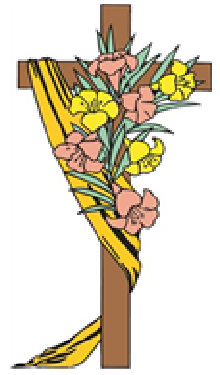

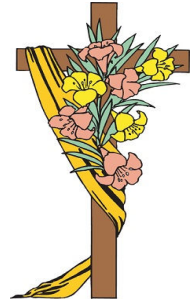
